

On the morning of Saturday, October 7, Amir Tibon and his wife were awakened by mortar rounds exploding near their home in Kibbutz Nahal Oz, a progressive Israeli settlement along the Gaza border. Soon, they were holding their two young daughters in the family's reinforced safe room, urging their children not to cry while they listened to the gunfire from Hamas attackers outside their windows. With his cell phone battery running low, Amir texted his father: "They're here."

Some 45 miles to the north, on the shores of Tel Aviv, Amir's parents saw the news at the same time that they received Amir's note. Still dripping from an early-morning swim, they jumped in their car and raced toward Nahal Oz, armed only with a pistol—but intent on saving their family at all costs.

Amir Tibon tells his family's harrowing story alongside the histories of the place they call home and the systems of power that have kept them and their neighbors in Gaza in harm's way for decades. This dynamic of purposeful hostility between Israel and its Palestinian neighbors will need to be fundamentally dismantled, he shows, if the region is to have any hope of peace. With deep sensitivity and drawing on Israeli and Palestinian sources, Tibon offers an unsparing but ultimately hopeful view of this seemingly intractable conflict and its global reverberations.



AMIR TIBON is an award-winning diplomatic correspondent for Haaretz, Israel's paper of record. From 2017-2020, Tibon was based in Washington, DC as a foreign correspondent for Haaretz, and he has also served as a senior editor for the newspaper's English edition.

Science THE GENIUS BAT by Yossi Yovel

Like others in this genre, The Genius Bat is not only about a particular non-human subject, but also about the writer and other scientists and some of their exploits. The material is intelligent and informative, and the style is unpretentious, witty, and anecdotal.

The bat, the only flying mammal, has a good deal of associated lore, and mystery and, for many of us, even initial aversion. In working with Yovel, and visiting his bat lab, we've gone through a kind of transformation about bats – the order Chiroptera. They are smart, and they have a sensory system – including a highly-developed capacity for echolocation – that is different from ours. Being in their world gives us a glimpse not only of their unique bat-ness but also of qualities and behaviors that are meaningful to us. Some bat species engage it what can best be described as altruism. Some have a spectacular mating practice known as lekking (think speed dating). And some male bats even lactate. Yovel also writes about using AI to research bat communication, which presents some especially intriguing possibilities for cross-species understanding.





YOSSI YOVEL, the head of the School of Neuroscience at Tel Aviv University, is both an ecologist and neurobiologist. But after the terrorist attack of October 7 and the events that followed, what can one do other than express one's horror and despair? David Grossman would not be himself if, after the initial shock, he did not ask the necessary painful questions: How could this massacre have taken place on Israeli soil? Why has the Netanyahu government, preoccupied with its scandals, completely lost sight of Gaza and the Palestinians there? And "who will we Israelis be when we rise from the ashes of this tragedy?"

In eleven essays, Grossman sketches the (pre)history of October 7 as a series of disastrous decisions by a nationalist government focused solely on maintaining power, for whom language, culture and freedom of thought are no longer indisputable values. Ultimately, Grossman asks the most important question of all: Is it even possible to imagine a side-by-side existence under these deplorable conditions?



DAVID GROSSMAN is the author of numerous works of fiction, nonfiction, and children's literature. His writing has appeared in The New Yorker and has been translated into more than forty languages. He is the recipient of many prizes, including the French Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres, the Buxtehuder Bulle in Germany, the Man Booker International Prize, and the Brenner Prize.

On the morning of October 7th, many of Israel's fundamental assumptions were shattered. The decades of hatred could not be wiped away or kept at bay. Israel's superior technology was not enough to keep it secure.

Hamas could not destroy Israel. But the sixteen years Hamas ruled Gaza was enough time for it to build a deeply entrenched military capability, in and under the coastal strip of two million inhabitants. The ultimate result was a months-long war with a horrific death-toll and the destruction of Gaza.

While Israelis united over the war, it was a temporary respite from their deep divide over the country's future and the Netanyahu coalition's extremism and ineptitude. The gulf between the government and the people rapidly widened as the leadership proved incapable of finding a strategy for Gaza or for the day after the war.

NO KING IN ISRAEL is the story of how Israel was forced to face its demons and confront the potential collapse of its foundational principles.



Against a backdrop of antisemitic paranoia, restrictions on Jewish life, and spasms of violence, Ethan and Ella, Jewish citizens of a nameless American city, meet and fall in love. Ella, a photojournalist, documents the changes in daily life, particularly among the city's Jewish residents. Some Jews, feeling inexplicably drawn to the unusual events, go underground to an abandoned subway system that seems to connect the entire world. Others leave for the south, forming militias and stockpiling weapons. But most, like Ethan, Ella, and her young son Michael, stay and try to make their way amid the hostility and small joys of the ever-changing landscape.

But then thousands of commercial planes are sucked from the sky. Air travel stops. Borders close. Refugees pour into the capital. Eventually all Jews in the city are forced to relocate to the Pale, an area sandwiched between a park and a river. There, under the watchful eye of border guards, drones and robotic dogs, they form a fragile new society.

Suspenseful, thought-provoking, and brilliantly conceived, Next Stop is an enthralling novel that explores the fault lines between our collective, national, and individual memories and how our deepest bonds can be unexpectedly reshaped in moments of crisis.




She has traveled to the year 1240, the year one of the most successful Crusades in history. As her relationship with Sir Jean starts to deepen, Idit begins to regularly visit the distant past. Their delicate affair unfolds in parallel with the story of her relationship with Halimi, and she is forced to confront the true and deep meaning of the multiplicity of love.

n the tradition of Gogol, with a Bulawayo's GLORYlike twist, comes a rueful satire on modern-day Russia: one elephant's epic journey towards the condemnation of war.

Arriving on a barge from Istanbul to Kerch on March 1st, 2022, Bobo is the war elephant gifted by the Turkish sultan to the Russian Tsar. He begins an arduous trek on foot across Russia on the way to Orenburg, where the Tsar huddles in his bunker, hiding from a losing war.

Travelling from city to village to town, Bobo – who expected to fall in love with his new homeland – gradually learns what Russia in the year 2022 is really like, After encountering unrelenting propaganda, corruption, police brutality and the miserable existence of the Tsar's subjects, Bobo discovers what he wants to stand for once he gets to shake off the shackles of servitude.

Expertly weaving the child-like and curious with frigid political reality, drawing on Russian history as well as the most recent news, and written with sparkling, biting wit, BOBO is a bildungsroman and a powerful statement against the Russian regime.

The author stopped the novel's 2023 Russian publication at the eleventh hour, fearing that the publisher and the distributors might be prosecuted for it.


