

As the rabbi's daughter, Yoyo Gold is supposed to set a good example for the other girls in her Orthodox community. She keeps kosher, does her schoolwork, cares for her younger siblings, and organizes the food distribution for Jewish Hunger Relief each week. She's also in charge of making sure her friends don't break any of the numerous rules observant Jews live by. It's no easy task, given that her best friend, Esti Saperstein, seems bent on breaking every rule there is.

When Esti goes too far and gets shipped across the country as punishment, Yoyo is left behind without her closest confidant. Suddenly, she's finding it much more difficult to be the model rabbi's daughter. The community's expectations feel more like burdens, her responsibilities more like chores. Plus, there are new distractions. There's a Reform girl, Mickey, volunteering at Jewish Hunger Relief, who makes TikTok videos and kisses boys. Then there's the handsome Shua Holtzman, a friend of Yoyo's older brother who has just been unceremoniously kicked out of boarding school for his loose interpretations of their faith.

What is Yoyo supposed to do with the feelings she has for Shua, or the thrills she gets from scrolling through social media with Mickey? And why should she be the only one abstaining from the modern world, when seemingly everyone else in her community is breaking one rule or another? Yoyo makes a gossipy anonymous TikTok account putting the hypocrites she knows on blast, but when it goes unexpectedly viral, she finds herself caught in a scandal that might cleave her from her community forever.

Isaac Blum's sophomore novel is a smart, witty examination of community, faith, and the difficult balance of old tradition in a new world.



Sure, his entire Orthodox Jewish community has just picked up and moved to the quiet, mostly non-Jewish town of Tregaron, but Hoodie's world hasn't changed that much. He's got basketball to play, studies to avoid, and a supermarket full of delicious kosher snacks to eat. The people of Tregaron aren't happy that so many Orthodox Jews are moving in at once, but that's not Hoodie's problem.

That is, until he meets and falls for Anna-Marie Diaz-O'Leary—who happens to be the daughter of the obstinate mayor trying to keep Hoodie's community out of the town. And things only get more complicated when Tregaron is struck by a series of antisemitic crimes that quickly escalate to deadly violence.

Hoodie finds himself caught between his first love and the only world he's ever known.

Adra Dantes always knew she'd inherit her father's pirate ship, the Worldeater, and its captaincy. What she didn't expect was that it would happen when she was only sixteen. When her half-brother Cameron attacked their father, tried to sink his ship, and stole a priceless treasure map leading to the first pirate king's grave, her father was left a shell of a man. Adra took possession of the Worldeater with one thing in mind: revenge. Her only goal is to find and kill Cameron, retrieve her father's map, and claim the treasure.

Her plans are thwarted by an unexplained surplus of magic in the world, noticed by Adra's best friend and quartermaster, Merrin, who is also the crew's mage. The flood of magic causes all kinds of disruption, from sea monsters born of nightmares to strange weather and haunting visions. The source of it is a creature known as the Devourer, and her lair lies under the sea. Adra and her crew must descend into the depths to strike a deal with her, then make a treacherous journey to recover what the Devourer has lost.

When Adra comes across an abandoned ship, she thinks she's found her brother, but the only soul left alive is a girl named Quinn. She's been impersonating Cameron for almost six months. She is both infuriating and beautiful, and Adra hates herself for being drawn to her. She ignores her feelings--anger, hatred, perhaps something a little more complex--hoping she can convince Quinn to help them.

But if she wants the Devourer to fix the damage she's done, Adra must return the treasure to her, not claim it as her father wished. She cannot ever regain the future he wanted for her. But she can help save the world, and she can still have her revenge. And she does--for a price.

Something Maybe Magnificent

Judy Blume meets Barbara Dee in the second book of this tender middle grade series!

Thirteen-year-old Victoria Reeves is determined to make this summer magnificent, especially since last summer didn't quite work out how she had hoped. She has her "No Fail Plan for the Perfect Summer Vacation" in place, complete with ambitious goals like getting published and forgetting all about her dad, and fun goals like reading as much Sylvia Plath as possible and keeping in shape with long runs (possibly some that include a certain cute new someone in the neighborhood).

But there's a gigantic wrench in her plan for perfection: Kyle Moreland. Her mom's new boyfriend. The guy who's stuck around much longer than anyone else (33 dates longer, to be exact). As Kyle starts to make himself at home—cooking for them, bringing them food, even joining their family outings—Victoria resolves to run him off—whatever it takes. Enlisting the help of her brother and sister, she hatches a plan that includes unwarranted blame, devious pranks, and generally making Kyle miserable until he decides to give up and go.

Despite Victoria's efforts, things get more serious between Kyle and her mother—but she refuses to give up. She can't let her family—or herself—get hurt again. As her efforts become more and more desperate and less and less like her, Victoria starts to realize that sabotaging Kyle doesn't feel good...it just makes her feel hollow inside. Part of her wonders if she's ruining something that could maybe, just maybe, actually be magnificent. But she's just speeding up the inevitable by getting rid of him before he can leave...right?



R.L. Toalson hates camping (unless she gets to sleep in a spider-proofed, air-conditioned cabin), though she does enjoy day trips to local parks and daily walks or runs in the wilderness behind her house in San Antonio, Texas, where she lives with her husband and six children. Her first middle grade novel, The Colors of the Rain, won the Arnold Adoff Poetry Honor Award in 2018, and her second middle grade novel, The Woods, was named to the International Literacy Association Children's Choices 2020 reading list.

Twelve-year-old Victoria Reeves is all set for her "First Magnificent Summer with Dad," even though it's been more than two years since she last saw him. She's ready to impress him with her wit, her maturity, and her smarts—at least until he shows up for the long road trip to Ohio with his new family, The Replacements, in tow.

But that's not the only unpleasant surprise in store. She's forced to eat bologna even though it's her least favorite food in the world. And has to sleep outside in a tent while The Replacements rest comfortably inside the family RV. But the worst thing is when she begins to suspect that Dad treats her as "less than" is for one simple reason: she's female.

As Victoria captures every moment of her less than magnificent summer in her journal, she discovers that the odds are stacked against her in the contest-no-one-knows-is-a-contest: Not only does her wit begin to crumble around Dad's multiple shaming jabs, but she gets her first period. And when Dad does the worst thing yet, she realizes she has a decision to make: will she let a man define her?


Linus Hyde is a color-blind, asthmatic 11-year-old from the suburbs of Kansas City. It's a year after his dad died in a car wreck, and Linus and his mom have moved across town to a new house, seeking a fresh start. Linus carries immense anger about losing his dad, but feels most connected to him as he picks up his art supplies for the first time since Dad died — art was the thing they did together.

Across the back fence of their new house is a creepy, monstrous looking tree owned by new neighbor Maude. Strange things start to happen — mysterious scratches, mauled animals, missing pets, terrorized neighbors. Linus and his two best friends (one old, one new,) realize all the weirdness is happening to people Maude knew in high school. They're convinced something unnatural is going on, and Maude and her strange tree are at the root.

Then a monster attacks. It has bark-like skin and comes from Maude's tree, confirming all their suspicions. By sheer luck, Linus has his sketchbook on hand and they see their next supernatural occurrence — but then his drawing traps the monster. Linus and his friends have to figure out why his artwork has such power, how Maude turned her tree into monsters, and how to stop them for good. But now, Maude is on to them. And the monsters just keep getting bigger.



Sarah Allen's first book, What Stars Are Made Of, was an ALA Notable Book of 2020 and her second, Breathing Underwater, was a Jr. Library Guild Selection for 2021. Kirkus Reviews called it "a heartfelt, multifaceted treasure hunt." Born and raised in Utah, she's currently a poetry MFA candidate and graduate instructor at the University of South Florida, Tampa, and spends her non-writing time watching David Attenborough documentaries and singing show-tunes too loudly. Penny Hope used to be brave, but that was before she met the Fear Maker. Years later, he still haunts her dreams—a tall, thin man with red eyes, in a haunted house in the woods, who devours human souls and leaves his victims' eyes hollow and empty. Penny's beloved grandma tells her to write down these nightmares as poems in her notebook. But then Penny starts seeing blank-eyed people in the waking world, too. She's the only one who notices.

As more people around her fall prey to the Fear Maker, Penny must gather her courage once and for all to save the souls of those she loves. Jonah has nothing: no TV, no toys or games, no bed, not even a blanket. But if you think he's miserable, think again! A kid as smart and kind as Jonah will always be able to seek out adventure and make the world around him that little bit better, despite all odds. Though a work of fiction, WHEN GRADPA JONAH WAS JUST A KID is based on a true story – the childhood experiences of the author's father, Elijah Levi. Growing up in Israel in the 1920s and 1930s, Elijah, who was of Yemenite decent, endured dire poverty at home and savage bullying at school because of his Mizrahi origins. Elijah later became a journalist and was also a member of the Lehi underground. That part of his life inspired the series CARTHAGO, written by Yannets and his brother Reshef Levi and recently awarded two prizes at Canneseries.



Yannets Levi is a writer of books and drama, a TV host and a performer. He is one of Israel's most popular writers for children and adults with 13 bestsellers in a row. He was awarded the 2010 Public Library Award, the 2016 Dvora Omer Award for Children's Literature and the 2021 Prime Minister's Prize.

A Jewish boy's bravery and kindness are tested after an antisemitic attack on his middle school in this rousing novel-in-verse.


Ever since twelve-year-old Josh Kline found an antisemitic note in his family's mailbox in third grade, he has felt uncomfortable about his Jewish identity. At a new school where he's pretty sure he's the only Jew, he's hoping to just keep religion out of everything . . . until the morning someone sprays swastikas all over the building. That's when everything changes.

In one of the school counseling groups set up in response to the attack, Josh finally reveals that he is Jewish, and quickly finds out there's more to the other kids in his grade too: All of them have their own struggles. Maybe Josh can do something to help—to "repair the world" as his rabbi teaches, by starting a Do More club to spread kindness. But making a difference is never simple, even when you have new friends by your side.

Fast-paced and conversation-starting, Josh's story is an empowering examination of prejudice, bullying, and how to take the first step toward change.

The Gray is a sensitively told middle grade story from Chris Baron about living with anxiety and finding ways to cope.

It's been a tough year for Sasha—he's been bullied at his middle school and his anxiety, which he calls the Gray, is growing. Sasha's dad tells him to "toughen up"—and he does, but with unfortunate, hurtful results. His parents and therapist agree that a summer in the country with his aunt might be the best medicine, but it's the last place he wants to be. He'll be away from his best friend, video games, and stuck in the house that reminds him of his beloved uncle who died two years earlier.

His aunt is supportive, and there are lots of places to explore, and even some potential new friends. When Sasha is introduced at a local ranch to a horse coincidentally--incredibly--nicknamed the Gray, he feels he's found a kindred spirit.

But his own Gray is ever-present. When one of his new friends disappears, Sasha discovers that the country is wilder and more mysterious than he imagined. He tries to muster enough courage to help in the search . . . but will the Gray hold him back?



Chris Baron is the award winning author of All of Me, an NCTE Notable Book, and The Magical Imperfect, a Sydney Taylor Book Award Notable Book/ a SLJ Best Book of 2021 & the forthcoming novels, The Gray (2023) Forest Heart (2024) all from Feiwel & Friends/Macmillan. He's a contributor to the Young Adult Anthology, Every Body Shines (Bloomsbury, 2021) and the author of Lantern Tree: (poetry) (2012) from CityWorks Press, winner of San Diego Book Award. He is a Professor of English at San Diego City College and the director of the Writing Center. He completed his MFA in Poetry in 1998 at SDSU. He lives in San Diego with his family.

Eleven-year-olds Tripti Kapoor, a feisty "word nerd" from Massachusetts, and Sam Cohen, a shy, imaginative, budding geologist from California, are both miserable at Camp Dilloway, a summer camp in upstate New York. On the last night of camp, they follow a shooting star to a creek. There they find silvery rocks glowing in the night. They each take one home, and a long-distance friendship begins.

It's soon clear that these are no ordinary rocks. They seem to move on their own, get strangely hot, and even take over Tripti and Sam's thoughts! Inspired by their mutual love of their favorite book series, The Dragon Gems, they dub the rocks Opal and Jasper, after the Dragon Gems in the books.

But others are interested in the stones too - including the owner of Camp Dilloway, who hides a secret of his own. Tripti and Sam must crack the Dragon Gems' code and keep them out of Dilloway's clutches, all while navigating middle school friendships and learning to stand up for what's right.

The opportunity would fulfill Anna's dream of going to space, but it would put the largest distance ever between her and her kids. Anna considered how she would connect with them as she orbited 1,400 km above their heads. It became clear what this extra-long commute called for: a story about a dragon.

Mama dragon has come home from an adventure like no other! Snuggling her baby dragons close, she tells them of her journey and how she thought of them all along the way. This heartwarming story, beautifully written in fun, lyrical rhyme and illustrated with stunning imagery, follows a dragon family's passion for adventure and their unwavering bond, even when they're separated...

KISSES FROM SPACE will fly to space on the Polaris Dawn mission and be read aloud to kids here on Earth. This story speaks to the duality so many mothers experience when they have to be separated from their children. Inspired by Polaris Program's enthusiastic support of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital®, Anna's proceeds from the book will be donated to benefit their efforts to cure cancer.





But when he meets Sofia the Tortoise, Theodor discovers that a real friend will appreciate you for who you are – and that only when you celebrate your true self instead of fighting against it will you be able to realize your full potential.

The Jerusalem-based educator and journalist Nastya Ryabtseva has never met Nataša Jovanić, an artist from Bosnia and Herzegovina. Yet, after having been introduced online by mutual acquaintances, Nastya and Nataša created this sweet and wise picture book about the freedom and joy that come with self-acceptance.



Nastya Ryabtseva is a Saint Petersburg-born, Jerusalem-based journalist and educator who has worked for various NGOs and covered social issues such as homelessness, adoption, disability etc. In March 2022, Ryabtseva founded Wild Walks, an initiative offering healing community experiences to Ukrainian- and Russian-speaking teens who moved to Israel because of Russia's invasion of Ukraine.



Nataša Jovanić is an artist and illustrator from Bosnia and Herzegovina. A graduate of the Academy of Arts, Banja Luka and the University of the Arts, Berlin, Jovanić has worked on magazine illustration (Bloom, UK; Honest History, USA), winning the Ilustrofest's First Prize. Jovanić has also illustrated books for children, including Patrick Kellegher's "A Witch and a Wizard Live Here."

Every Tuesday, Yotam's grandfather takes him to a coffee shop after kindergarten, where Grandpa Amnon drinks coffee and Yotam likes to draw. One day, Yotam has a question: "Grandpa, what's on your face?"

Grandpa Amnon explains that the lines on his face are wrinkles, and they are something that grownups get. He tells Yotam the stories of how he got each of his wrinkles. Every Wrinkle Has a Story is a pro-aging story of curiosity, intergenerational storytelling and quiet contemplation through artwork.


